Abuse BOYS: The Neglected Victims of Sexual Abuse

Mic Hunter, 1990

Topic: Child & Teen Abuse, Sexual Violence

The sexual abuse of boys is a problem that has remained veiled in myth and misinformation for far too long. While the sexual abuse of female children has been widely documented, there are lingering assumptions that the sexual abuse of male children is rare, that the consequences are less serious than for girls, and even that boy's share responsibility with their perpetrators. In this long overdue book, psychologist Mic Hunter, who has extensive clinical experience treating male victims of child sexual abuse, explores these and other myths and offers an overview of the recovery process.

Abused Men: Hidden Side of DV

Philip W. Cook, 1990

Topic: Men & DV, General DV

This book presented the reality of abused men to their partners. With several stories from survivors of domestic violence, the author pointed out that the real issues and the lack of resource for male victims of domestic violence. It also provides legal and social services to victims of domestic violence.

(The) Abusive Personality

Donald Dutton, 1998

Topic: General DV

Physical violence may be the most overt manifestation of relationship abuse, but maltreatment of intimate partners takes many other forms as well. This integrative work explores the nature of male abusiveness by focusing on the development of a particular personality constellation—one that is easily threatened, jealous, and fearful, and that masks these emotions with anger and demands for control. Presenting results of controlled research with over 400 batterers, Dutton shows that many abusers exhibit high levels of trauma symptoms. This symptomology is cogently linked to elements of childhood experience including witnessing of violence, the use of shaming techniques by parents, and insecure attachment; and, in turn, to such characteristics as terror of abandonment and the inability to regulate one's emotions or deal with conflict effectively. A concluding chapter focuses on treatment.

The ATRIUM protocol is based on *Dusty Miller’s Trauma Reenactment Model*, published in 1994, an assessment and recovery model for people with trauma-related mental health and addiction challenges. ATRIUM is intended for the following:

People with substance abuse and other addictive behaviors

People who addictively engage in harmful relationships

People who enact violence and abuse against others.

After Silence: Rape and My Journey Back

Nancy Venable Raine, 1998

This book is Nancy Venable Raine’s eloquent, profoundly moving response to her rapist’s command to “shut up,” a command that is so often echoed by society and internalized by rape victims. Beginning with her assault by a stranger in her home in 1985, Raine’s riveting narrative of the ten-year aftermath of her rape brings to light the truth that survivors of traumatic experiences know – a trauma does not end when you find yourself alive. For anyone who has suffered from or witnessed the shattering effects of rape, this story inspires and points the way to healing.

Assessing Woman Battering in Mental Health Services

Edward W. Gondolf, 1998

Topic: Mental Health

This book challenges traditional mental health approaches to domestic violence and offers alternative strategies and procedures to improve the response to battered women. It is a guide to the conceptual and practical issues associated with identifying and assessing battered women in mental health services.

Balancing the Power: Creating a Crisis Center for People with Disabilities

Diane K. Akers, 2005

Topic: People with Disabilities

ASAP, Safe Place; This book presents, a systematic guide for domestic violence and sexual assault centers aiming to provide accessible services to abuse survivors with disabilities. “*Balancing the Power*” includes strategies for working with people with various types of disabilities, including tips for adhering to the American with Disabilities Act. This book was written with input and advice from people with disabilities, crisis workers, disability service staff, and disability rights advocates from across the country.

Battle Cries: Black Women & Intimate Partner Abuse

Hillary Potter, 2008

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Topic: Culture & Diversity

Battle Cries is an eye-opening examination of African American women's experiences with intimate partner abuse, the methods used to contend with abusive mates, and the immediate and enduring consequence resulting from the maltreatment. Based on intensive interviews with 40 African American women abused by their male partners, Potter's analysis takes into account variations in their experiences based on socioeconomic class, education level, and age, and discusses the common abuses and perceptions they share.

Battered Black Women and Welfare Reform: Between a Rock and a Hard Place

Dana-Ain Davis, SUNY Press, 2006

Topic: Culture & Diversity

This timely and compelling ethnography examines the impact of welfare reform on women seeking to escape domestic violence. Dana-Ain Davis profiles twenty-two women, thirteen of whom are Black, living in a battered women's shelter in a small city in upstate New York. She explores the contradictions between welfare reform's supposed success in moving women off of public assistance and toward economic self-sufficiency and the consequences welfare reform policy has presented for Black women fleeing domestic violence. Focusing on the intersection of poverty, violence, and race, she demonstrates the differential treatment that Black and White women face in their entanglements with the welfare bureaucracy by linking those entanglements to the larger political economy of a small city, neoliberal social policies, and "racialized" ideas about Black women as workers and mothers.

Battered Wives

Del Martin, 1976

Topic: General DV

Battered Wives is the first general introduction to the problem of abuse. Battered Wives includes excellent critical summaries of the legal and political status of battered wives and the extent to which their immediate predicament must be understood in broad political terms. Del Martin argues that the basis of the problem is not in husband/wife interaction or immediate triggering events, but in the institution of marriage, historical attitudes toward women, the economy, and inadequacies in legal and social service systems.

The Battered Women

Lenore E. Walker, 1979

Topic: General DV

The author explained the cycle of domestic violence and the resources for the survivor of domestic violence based on her own experiences. It is a well-combined the real stories and the resources to understand DV cycle and to help the survivors well.

The Battered Women Syndrome

Lenore E Walker, Ed.D.-1984

A research project to identify key psychological and sociological factors that compose the battered woman syndrome, test specific theories and collect comprehensive data on battered women.

Battered Women & Feminist Lawmaking

Elizabeth M. Schneider, 2000

Topic: Legal Issues, General DV

Women's rights advocates have long argued that violence against women denies women equality and citizenship, but it took a movement of feminist activists and lawyers to set about realizing this vision and transforming domestic violence from a private problem into a public harm. This book examines the legal process which has brought the pervasiveness and severity of domestic violence to public attention.

Battered Women and Their Families – Intervention Strategies and Treatment Programs

Albert R. Roberts, 2007

Topic: General DV

The definitive work on battered women is now in a third edition. Considered the complete, in-depth guide to effective interventions for this pervasive social disease, *Battered Women and Their Families* has been updated to include new case

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studies, cultural perspectives, and assessment protocols. In an area of counseling that cannot receive enough attention, Dr. Robert's work stands out as an essential treatment tool for all clinical social workers, nurses, physicians, and graduate students who work with battered women on a daily basis.

Battered Women as Survivors

Edward W. Gondolf & Ellen R. Fisher, 1988 & 1999

Topic: General DV

In this book, the author's present fresh empirical research that counters the popular "learned helplessness" theory with evidence that battered women are, in fact, help seekers who persistently search for resources and support services. They also discuss several heretofore "accepted" modes of thinking, such as: victimization, help seeking, battered women vs. batterers, and community service delivery.

Battered Women in the Courtroom: The Power of Judicial Response

James Ptacek, 1999

Topic: Legal Issues

Recent laws have given women much needed rights in seeking protection from abusive men, but judges still hold the authority to issue restraining orders or send batterers to jail. In this book, the author looks at the types of violence that women report to the courts, and analyzes how judges exercise their authority in restraining order hearings. Also discussed is how judges perceive their role in negotiations with women, and their impact on women's efforts to escape the social entrapment of violence.

Battered Women, Children, and Welfare Reform: The Ties that Bind

Ruth A. Brandwein, 1999

Topic: Child & Teen Abuse, General DV

Topics covered include the following: how batterers restrict their partner's job and educational opportunities, preventing them from leaving the welfare rolls; how child support regulations require disclosure of information that may increase the danger of family violence; and how child abuse is linked to the need of welfare.

(The) Batterer as Parent: Addressing the Impact of DV on Family Dynamics

Lundy Bancroft & Jay G. Silverman, 2002

Topic: Child & Teen Abuse, General DV

This book takes the reader inside homes affected by domestic violence to impart an understanding of the atmosphere that battering men create for the children who live with them. The authors show how partner abuse affects each relationship in a family; explain how children's emotional recovery is linked to the healing of their mothers; and discuss the post-separation parenting behaviors of men who batter; including their use of custody litigation as a tool of abuse.

Batterer Intervention Systems: Issues, Outcomes, & Recommendations

Edward W. Gondolf, 2002

Topic: Batterer Intervention, General DV

This book takes research from a multi-site evaluation of batterer programs to critique current experimental evaluation practices and present alternatives to assessing effectiveness of batterer's treatment programs. A four-year follow-up of program participants is also examined.

Topic: Organizational Development

This book overviews general topics and guidelines about the non-profit organization. It covers (1) myths and urban legends about nonprofits, (2) a framework that outlines and clarifies your responsibilities, (3) board and committee structures, (4) the relationship between the board and the executive director, (5) big decisions boards often face, (6) board self-management and self-assessment, (7) recruiting new members and achieving diversity, (8) ideas for holding productive board meetings, and (9) fundraising and financial accountability.

Beyond Labels: Working with Abuse survivors with Mental Illness symptom or Substance Abuse

Diane King Akers, M.Ed. & Michelle "Shell" Schwartz, M.A. & Wendie H. Abramson, LMSW, 2007

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Topic: Mental Health, Substance Abuse

The reader is provided practical information, tools, and resources for domestic violence and rape crisis center staff. The book explores the strong connection between trauma, mental illness and substance abuse; provides strategies for creating a welcoming and trauma-informed approach to service provision; and offers tips for working with survivors who are experiencing depression, anxiety, dissociation, psychosis and self-injury, suicidal thoughts, and substance abuse.

Called to Account

M'Liss Switzer & Katherine Hale

Topic: General DV

It is a book based on the author's life. Especially this book has been written to demonstrate the important of unbiased law enforcement systems in brining abusers to account. This powerful book will provide hope for others who suffer from domestic violence by demonstrating our human potential to grow and change.

Chain, Chain, Change: For Black Women dealing with Physical & Emotional Abuse

Evelyn C. White, 1985

Topic: Culture & Diversity

This book is for the black woman who wants to understand the role of emotional abuse and violence in her life, and for the activist and professional who works with domestic violence. It discusses stereotypes and cultural assumptions and offers advice on getting support from emergency agencies, the legal system, shelters, counselors, and the church. It also exposes the cultural and institutional barriers that black women face and offers an opportunity for a new understanding.

Chain, Chain, Change: For Black Women dealing in Abusive Relationship

Evelyn C. White, 1994

Topic: Culture & Diversity

This book offers supportive, practical information for African-American women who are or have been in a physically or emotionally abusive relationship. Written by a well-known writer and speaker on Black women's physical and emotional health, this book provides information on identifying the different aspects of abuse, the effects of domestic violence on the family, the impact of racism and sexism, and suggestions for how to reach out for help and get positive support from emergency agencies, shelter, the legal system, counselors, the church, family and friends. A new chapter addressing the experiences of Black lesbians who are battered by their partners is included in this expanded edition.

Changing Violent Men

R. Emerson Dobash, Russell P. Dobash, Kate Cavanagh, & Ruth Lewis, 2000

Topic: Men & DV

'Changing Violent Men' is based on the authors' evaluation research of various criminal justice responses and treatment programs for men who use violence against a woman partner. The authors also provide (1) detailed descriptions of the nature of violence, (2) considerations of interventions with violence men, particularly abuser programs, (3) a focus on whether violence men can change, and (4) theorizing about the process of personal change among those men who do change their behavior.

Child Abuse, Domestic Violence, and Animal Abuse

This book focuses on the complexity of the challenges facing judges, lawyers, legislators, and mental health professionals in developing safe and effective strategies for resolving custody disputes. The authors outline the essential differences between custody disputes with and without allegations and findings of domestic violence.

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Children and Trauma: A Guide for Parents and Professionals

Cynthia Monahan, 1997

This book teaches parents and professionals about the effects of various ordeals on children—from accidents to deaths to school issues—and offers a blueprint for restoring a child's sense of safety and balance. Monahan is a child psychologist who specializes in the treatment of psychological trauma, offers hope and reassurance for parents. She suggests straightforward ways to help kids through tough times and describes in detail the warning signs that indicate a child needs professional help.

Children Exposed to Domestic Violence: Current Issues in Research, Intervention, Prevention, and Policy Development

In this book, the coercive control model Stark develops resolves three of the most perplexing challenges posed by abuse: why these relationships endure, why abused women develop a profile of problems seen among no other group of assault victims, and why the legal system has failed to win them justices.

Collaboration Handbook – Creating, Sustaining, and Enjoying the Journey

Michael Winer & Karen Ray

Topic: Coordinated Community Response & Collaboration

This handbook provides how to get a general structure of collaboration. It pointed out that (1) how to know if collaboration is the best way to accomplish, (2) if your collaboration has the ingredients to succeed, (3) how to select the best structure for your collaboration, (4) how to manage the four stages of collaboration, and (5) when it makes sense to test the waters with a pilot project.

Topics discussed include: homophobia, racism, civil rights, economic security, educational equity, and environmental justice.

Community Research As Empowerment

Janice L. Ristock & Joan Pennell, 1996

Topic: Other

This volume invites readers to take part in reshaping the process of research aimed at social action through critical analysis of the power dynamics. Encouraging the development of "feminist" links, at the same time it stresses the importance of "postmodern interruptions": the contradictions and gaps that a postmodern perspective reveals, which prevent inappropriate fixation on any one "solution" to complex social problems. The authors present detailed examples drawn from their own work, and specific research instruments used in this work are included. Confidentiality & Privacy in Social Work

Donald T. Dickson, Ph.D., 1998

This book presents an overview of confidentiality and privacy issues for social workers. The author discusses the law of confidentiality in detail, necessitating a clear explanation of what a promise of confidentiality may mean. Also covered are issues around access to specific types of records, the use of dual record keeping, releases, subpoenas, and record retention and destruction.

Confronting Chronic Neglect: The Education & Training of Health Professionals on Family Violence

Institute of Medicine, 2002

Topic: Health Care

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This book addresses some of the barriers to screening for domestic violence by health care professionals. It offers specific recommendations for raising awareness of the issue of domestic violence, and discusses ways to involve health care professionals in assuming greater responsibility for responding to victims.

Crime & Elder Abuse: An Integrated Perspective

Brian K. Payne, Ph.D., 2000

Topic: Abuse in Later Life

This book is based on the idea that as America's elderly population increases, so will elderly victimization; and only through advanced understanding of the problem will policymakers, practitioners, and educators be prepared to limit the negative consequences associated with the victimization of older adults. Topics examined include: crimes committed against the elderly, victimization effects, intervention measures, and responding to crimes committed against the elderly.

Crossing the Threshold: Female Officers and Police Perpetrated DV

Diane Wetendorf, 2005

Topic: General DV

Crossing the Threshold examines how male police officers' institutional power filters down into their intimate relationships, and why the institution of policing has historically ignored or denied police-perpetrated violence against women. A brief look at the profession's historical treatment of women and minorities provides the background for this analysis of police-perpetrated domestic violence. Though the book focuses on female officers' experience of abuse at the hands of male officers and the institutional response to that abuse, the book is insightful and relevant reading for civilian victims, advocates, attorneys, police supervisors, administrators, chiefs and sheriffs.

(The) Dance of Anger

Harriet G. Lerner, Ph.D., 1985

Topic: General DV

In this guidebook, Lerner shows women how to turn anger into a constructive force for reshaping their lives. She shows the causes and patterns of anger and offers specific strategies for making meaningful and lasting changes in important relationships. Basing her findings on a decade of clinical investigation, she illustrates how and why our anger often protects rather than challenges existing relationship dynamics. She also explains the difficulties women have not only in getting angry but also in using their anger to gain a stronger and more independent sense of self.

Dangerous Dating: Helping Young Women

Patricia Riddle Gaddis, 2000

Topic: Teen Dating Violence, Dating Violence

This book offers tips and guidance for parents, counselors, and pastors on how to help teens avoid or break out of an abusive dating relationship. It provides information on how to judge the appropriateness of a relationship, how to respond when a young woman is in danger, and where to get help. The book also includes a tool for girls to assess their own relationships.

Dangerous Exits: Escaping Abusive Relationship in Rural America

Walter S. DeKeseredy & Martin D. Schwartz, 2009

Topic: General DV

This book pointed out the challenges in which are the perceptions that rural communities are safe havens from the brutality of urban living. Identifying hidden crimes of economic blackmail and psychological mistreatment, and the complex relationship between patriarchy and abuse, the authors propose concrete and effective solutions, giving voice to women who have often suffered in silence.

The contributors highlight how female victims of abuse are often blamed for failing to protect their children and warn against the marginalization of domestic violence. Individual chapters consider children's views and experiences.

Domestic Violence and Health Care

Of all women battered by their partners in the United States, only a small percent are correctly diagnosed as victims of abuse. The medical community has a unique opportunity to intervene, but many health care professionals need more training to recognize the abuse, tools to intervene and information on where to refer victims for additional assistance. This study alerts such professionals to signs of abuse and helps prepare them to deal sensitively and appropriately with the needs of victims. The author provides vital information on the impact that examination and documentation may have upon subsequent prosecution of the batterer, while sample questions and forms assist examiners to record the most accurate information possible.

Empowering Survivors of Abuse: Health Care for Battered Women

Dr. Scott, details examples of the strategies used by twenty characters who have recovered and the survivor (with or without the help of a family member, friend or counselor) is encouraged to identify with one or more of them and follow in their footsteps.

Neither Angels nor Demons

Kathleen J. Ferraro, 2006

Topic: General DV, Legal Issues

After interviewing forty-five women charged with criminal offenses (more than half of whom killed their abusers; the other participated in a range of violence crimes related to domestic violence), the author used their stories to illuminate the complex interactions between violent partners, their children, and the legal system. The author contends that a more nuanced understanding of the connection of intimate partner violence to women's offending will enhance the development of public policies designed to promote safety and well-being and foster a sense of hope.

This is a story about how I was saved by love at a time when most people considered me beyond rescue", begins Victor Rivas Rivers in this powerful chronicle of how he escape the war zone of domestic violence-too often regarded as a "private family matter"-and went on to become a good man.

Protecting Children from Domestic Violence: Strategies for Community Intervention

This book introduces a new model of “woman-defined” advocacy that is designed to bridge the gap between a battered woman’s perspective and a victim advocate’s perception. Saving Bernice: Battered Women, Welfare, and Poverty

This book tells the story of Bernice Hampton, a woman who became a victim of domestic violence at the age of fourteen, and applied for welfare at age eighteen. Her story illustrates how abuse and welfare trap battered women. Whenever Bernice tried to go to training or get a job, her partner physically punished her. To go to work, she would have to leave the relationship, but she did not see a way to do so without risking her life. As most of the welfare money went to pay the monthly rent, she was also trapped by poverty: her lack of funds further hampered her ability to devise a workable safety plan. Bernice’s experiences illustrate the radically different kinds of assistance that need to be implemented in welfare-to-work policies. By examining her story on domestic violence and welfare, this book draws on a single life to explain and explore the actions and motivations of many poor women on welfare.

Scared to Leave, Afraid to Stay

Barry Goldstein, 2002

This book presents the stories of ten women who fought the courts and their abusers to gain safety for themselves and their children. Violent No More: Helping Men End Domestic Violence

Using insight and narratives from his experience as a Batterer's Group facilitator for the Duluth Abuse Intervention Project in Minnesota, the author writes this book to batterers wanting to change. He helps men to understand the roots of their violence, take responsibility for their actions, and build relationships based on mutual respect. He includes stories of previously violent men and of women who were abused.

Based on extensive interviews with survivors, Leslie explains the personal and theological issues they raise, what they found helpful from religious professionals, the images and metaphors most germane to their trauma and recovery, and how they coped with or healed from the experience of rape.

Why Does He Do That? Inside the Minds of Angry & Controlling Men
